

Our 5th Principle is "to affirm and promote the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large." This is our opportunity to exercise this principle!

Sunday Services

Sunday, April 7 – Dr. Michael Stoltzfus, “Bible and Homosexuality: Rethinking Traditional Interpretations”

We will discuss the handful of biblical passages that have traditionally been interpreted as anti-gay and lesbian. Specifically examining the Genesis 19 account of Sodom, the Holiness Codes of Leviticus, and two Pauline Epistles—First Corinthians and Romans. We may discover that the bible has little to say about homosexuality and what it does have to say has little relevance to contemporary issues and concerns.

Dr. Mike Stoltzfus, Professor in the VSU Philosophy and Religious Studies Department, is a regular speaker at our church.

Sunday, April 14 – Rev. Fred Howard, “God and Civility”

Recently, an essay called “Why I Raise My Children Without God” appeared in CNN’s iReport. It caused quite a stir, and generated a passionate online debate. I think the essay and the response it engendered are critically important - but probably not for the reasons you might think. This morning I will share some thoughts on this remarkable online conversation. Sunday, April 21 – Rev. George Bennett

A sermon on the topic of aging, based on Richard Rohr’s book “Falling Upward.” Rev. Bennett’s message is on the voyage into the mystery and beauty of healthy spiritual maturity.

Rev. George Bennett, a retired Christian Minister, member of the Valdosta Area Ministerial Association and longtime friend of the UU Church of Valdosta, will be bringing our message this Sunday. For several years, Rev. Bennett was a regular monthly speaker for our congregation and has had a long association with UU Valdosta. Sunday, April 28 – Rev. Fred Howard, “Chaos”

Is that an unusual title for a sermon? The word has been revived in the last few years, because of new discoveries and new applications of chaos theory in math and science. The use of the word that I will primarily be referring to this morning is chaos as the second stage of community building as outlined by Scott Peck in his book “The Different Drum.” Chaos is an unpredictable time in the life of a community, and unpredictability tends to generate fear in us. But Peck also gives us great reasons to see hope in the midst of chaos. This stage is infinitely preferable to being stuck in the first stage, which many so-called communities are. There is always a

way out of chaos and a way forward. This morning I will share some thoughts on this.

Annual Congregational Meeting

Our annual congregational meeting will be held after the service and Meet and Greet on Sunday, April 28th. On the agenda will be election of officers for the Board of Directors for 2013-2014 and approval of the budget for the next fiscal year, which begins July 1, 2013. A reminder that, according to our bylaws, “Any member, who is at least seventeen years old, who has been a member for a minimum of thirty (30) days prior to the vote and has made an annual monetary contribution of record to the congregation, is eligible to vote.”

“The Power of Myth” Class

Fred Howard is facilitating this class on “The Power of Myth” using video from the popular PBS series of conversations between the mythologist Joseph Campbell and journalist Bill Moyers. The class meets after Meet and Greet on the Sundays Rev. Howard is in charge of the Sunday service.

MINISTERIAL MUUSINGS

Rev. Fred Howard

April 2013

As you may have already heard, the Helpers Unlimited arm of the Lowndes Associated Ministries to People (LAMP) ceased operations in February of this year due to lack of funding. This left quite a void in the community for people who are seeking assistance with emergency needs for certain basic shelter and survival needs. All churches in Valdosta, including UU Valdosta, have noticed a marked increase in appeals for assistance. So, to fill the void left by the termination of Helpers Unlimited, several congregations of the Valdosta Area Ministerial Association are stepping up and forming Lowndes Area Crisis Care (LACC.)

LACC's purpose will be to provide assistance to citizens who have emergency financial needs for such items as utilities, rent, food, medication, and the like. Its funding will come primarily through the benevolence of local area churches. It will be staffed by volunteers, also from local area churches. Volunteers will meet with and assess the needs of people referred from local churches and other social service agencies. LACC will primarily act as a bridge during these emergency situations, and all efforts will be coordinated with other social service agencies so as not to duplicate efforts. Clients will, at all times, be encouraged to maintain responsibility for their own situations.

I am very proud that our church is included in those congregations who are stepping up. Our board has decided to participate significantly in this endeavor by making a financial contribution to LACC on a monthly basis.

LACC also needs volunteers to staff the office of LACC and to interview those who are referred for assistance. Those who volunteer will be brought up to speed on the policies and procedures of LACC, the services that it can provide, and the network of social services agencies to which its clients can be referred. Volunteers will always work in conjunction with others in the LACC office and volunteers will always have a supervisor to assist them in making referrals and to give guidance in the decision making process of dispensing emergency aid.

LACC is asking for a commitment of 2 hours a week from all those who feel called to this ministry. The only requirement to volunteer is that you have a compassion for those in genuine need of the basic essentials of life. Training of volunteers will begin very soon. If interested in serving, contact Fred or Richard Hart at Trinity Presbyterian Church. I hope those of you who have a couple of hours a week that you can devote to this crucial service will join me in standing with those in need.

Notes from Kids' RE - Sue Bailey

Another good reason for attending this year is it will be an Assembly when a new Moderator is elected. And although it will be difficult to say good-bye to Gini Courter, there are two capable candidates running for the position and as you know from last month's column I am supporting Tamara Payne-Alex.

The Arc of North Florida

Cliff Adams, one of our members, is on the Board of Directors for The Arc North Florida, Inc., which is a membership organization providing advocacy, employment training, and living services for people with disabilities in Baker, Suwannee, Hamilton, Lafayette, and Columbia counties. As a community based and qualified 501(C)(3) charity, The Arc North Florida provides services to all adults with a variety of intellectual and developmental disabilities including mental retardation, cerebral palsy, spina bifida and autism. In addition many of our clients have visual, hearing, physical and emotional disabilities.
