#### **Sunday Services**

Sunday, August 4 - Rev. Bertrum Whitfield, Transitions with Grace: Helping Our Family Members and Ourselves Rev. Bertrum Whitfield, Chaplain at the Presbyterian Home in Quitman, will speak on working with elders and their families when transitioning to assisted living or nursing homes. For many this is a difficult transition, leaving long-time, sometimes life-time homes, and moving into unfamiliar spaces with new ways of doing things. For family members, it can be almost as difficult, including feelings of sadness, regret at not being able to care for the family member at home, and the difficulty of uprooting the family member. Formerly a chaplain at South Georgia Medical Center, Rev. Whitfield has also worked with many individuals experiencing difficult and life-threatening health issues. He is a "board-eligible" chaplain, and this fall he will complete the five-year process of becoming a board-certified chaplain with the final board interview. His seminary work was at Virginia Union University, where he completed a M.Div., specializing in Christian Education. Prior to his time as a chaplain, Rev. Whitfield served as a Navy Communications Chief.

# Sunday, August 11 – Dr. Michael Stoltzfus, "Spiritual But Not Religious"

"I'm spiritual but not religious" is becoming the rallying cry of many in contemporary American culture. What might people mean by saying this? How are spirituality and religion similar and different? We will explore these issues by reflecting on the idea of practice, the nature of belief, and the role of individuality. We will also explore the common criticisms spiritual but not religious people make of traditional religion. Dr. Stoltzfus is a professor in the Philosophy and Religious Studies Department at VSU and a regular speaker each month at our congregation. We welcome him back after a summer break.

# PRESIDENT'S CORNER CAROL STILES

I had the honor of representing our congregation at the UUA General Assembly held in Louisville, KY, June 19-23 - and the additional honor of speaking at a Sunday Service in early July about my trip to GA. General Assembly is, of course, the gathering of congregational voting delegates who discuss and vote upon many different items – that is, General Assembly is how UU's carry out governance. But it is also much more – music, worship, workshops, social justice, and inspirational speakers, including the poet Frank X. Walker, activist and writer Wendell Berry, and interfaith activist Eboo Patel, this year's Ware Lecturer. At GA, the UUA delegates overwhelmingly passed the "Immigration as a Moral Issue" Statement of Conscious (SOC). This SOC has been under study since GA 2010, and the statement presented at GA was finely honed by the Commission on Social Witness based upon many discussions / comments before and at GA 2013. Briefly (and quoting from a *UU World* GA blog): "The SOC calls on UUs to 'affirm that all immigrants, regardless of legal status, should be treated justly and humanely." A moral immigration policy will include: a path to legal permanent residency and citizenship; work visas; due process; and preservation of family unity, among other things...."

Eboo Patel, in the Ware Lecture at GA, asked this question: "What UU stories, language, ideas might you call upon to give expression to your conviction that interfaith cooperation is an article of your faith?" Immigration reform and human rights for immigrants are in the national conscience right now, perhaps more than any time before. The UUA and many other denominations have spoken out about immigration reform and fair treatment of immigrants. I believe that we need to prepare ourselves better on this social justice concern, so that we may develop a language to be able to "Stand on the Side of Love...With Immigrant Families," as the sign at our entrance proclaims. To this end, we will be holding some after-service conversations this fall, using the UUA curriculum developed for this Statement of Conscience. It all starts August 25 – join us for the service that will kick off this effort and watch for announcements of further conversations.

Finally, consider attending a UUA General Assembly in the future – it is an experience you won't forget!

The book is "The Left Hand of Darkness" by Ursula Le Guin. This is a book which, among other issues, deals with the significance of gender. The story takes place on a planet where the humanoid inhabitants at different times during their life cycle, are biologically female and at other times male. It is an interesting story which raises provocative questions about gender roles. The book is available in the library and should be available cheaply as a used book on Amazon. The group gathers for a potluck and fellowship for the first hour and then begins the discussion at 7:30 PM ending around 8:30 PM after choosing the next book. The group chooses books related to difference. All are welcome. It's always more interesting if you've read the book but you're always welcome whether you have done so or not. #### PIZZA AND A MOVIE

In Changeling (Rated R, 2008) Christine Collins (Angelina Jolie), a single mother, returns to her Los Angeles home from work to find her ten-year-old son Walter (Gattlin Griffith) missing. When she seeks help from the LAPD to locate him, she encounters a morass resembling the fate of the character in a Kafka short story who repeatedly seeks justice from the law for many years, only to be told by a guard, "It is true that no-one else has passed here, that is because this door was always meant solely for you, but now, it is closed forever." After five months, authorities present Collins with a boy in order to counter negative public perception brought on by their failure to solve the serial killing of many boys. When she determines he is not Walter, she resumes her emotional appeal for help. To silence her press appeals, Chief Davis

(Colm Feore) sends her to LA County hospital's "psychopathic ward" for psychiatric evaluation and protective custody on the pretext of mental derangement because she refuses to accept a contrived version of reality. Radio evangelist Gustave Biegleb (John Malkovich) launches a crusade to release Collins and women like her jailed because the police conveniently label them "crazy." Among critics who praise the film, Roger Ebert states, "The film simply tells its relentless story and rubs the LAPD's face in it. This is the story of an administration that is directed from the top down to lie, cheat, torture, extract false confessions that serve to protect its image." Other critics pan the film, including Stephen Garret, who writes in Esquire (May, 2008): "Ultimately all of Eastwood's genre-blending comes up with nothing more than a hollow highbrow message movie that lacks all the blood and verve of its lowbrow inspirations."
