Sunday Services

Sunday, August 2 – Dr. Pat Miller, "Reflections on Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End by Atul Gawande"

It would seem that Atul Gawande—surgeon, professor, and medical writer—would be less surprised by death. Perhaps like Emily Dickens, he could not stop for death. So death stopped for him—at least as a topic and distant but persistent cousin. In this book, Gawande explores the options for dealing with the aged, how we deal with the dying, and what it might mean for a man whose profession says death equals failure but who must still take another step. By the end, readers (at least those of us of a certain age) are allowed to get more thoughtfully comfortable in those shoes.

Dr. Pat Miller is a professor of English and teaches in the journalism program at Valdosta State University.

Sunday, August 9 – Dr. Tom Aiello, "A Historical Perspective on Confederate Memorials."

Dr. Tom Aiello will present a historical perspective on the issues surrounding the placement and preservation of Confederate memorials, a topic which has recently taken greater prominence here in Valdosta. Nationally, the presence of the Confederate flag, particularly those displayed at some public institutions, has been brought to the forefront after the massacre of nine people at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Charleston, SC.

Tom Aiello is president of the UU Church of Valdosta and is an Associate Professor of History at Valdosta State University.

Sunday, August 16 – Dr. Lavonna Lovern, "Native American Spirituality"

Dr. Lavonna Lovern will give a brief outline of some of the differences between Native American spiritual concepts and Western spiritual concepts. The talk will focus on the idea of energy as related to the concept of "All My Relations."

Dr. Lovern has been involved at the university level for 30 years in global Indigenous studies. She is currently in the Department of Philosophy and Religious Studies and the Department of Native

American Studies at VSU. Her work is in Native American and global Indigenous health and disability and Native American Education. She is involved in the translation of traditional Indigenous knowledge systems into Western cultures in order to assist Western people with a more accurate understanding of Indigenous communities. She has worked with global Indigenous communities as well as Native American communities throughout the United States on issues of health and disability, education, Indian Child Welfare Act, and cultural translation.

Sunday, August 23 – Dr. Dennis Marks, "Time & Space Make Everything Possible, Including Themselves"

The Periodic Table of the chemical elements is a consequence of there being atoms of matter. Different elements arise because the electrons around the nucleus must have different quantum numbers (whole numbers that describe the size, shape, orientation, and spin of an electron orbit). Four different quantum numbers are needed because of the four dimensions of space-time. But what if we had a different number of space dimensions and/or time dimensions? It turns out that there is a periodic table of the algebras describing the geometries with any number of spatial and temporal dimensions, which implies the existence of atoms of time and space. These atoms grow and grow spontaneously, making the universe expand faster and faster. As it expands, it opens up more and more possibilities of increasing complexity. Atoms of time and space make everything possible, spontaneously.

Dr. Dennis Marks is Professor and Department Head, Emeritus, of the Department of Physics, Astronomy, and Geosciences, Valdosta State University. He has shared his knowledge and love of the universe with the congregation of the UU Church of Valdosta on numerous occasions.
