# Sunday, Feb. 1 – Dr. Michael Stoltzfus, "Dorothy Day: Pilgrimage to Hospitality, Community, and Peace"

Dorothy Day was a writer, an activist, and the co-founder of the Catholic Worker movement in the 1930s that continues to follow the precepts of voluntary poverty, non-violence, hospitality, and intentional community. Her pilgrimage was rooted in the mystical union of the spiritual with the physical, the love of God with the development of human dignity. In the midst of human suffering and misery, Dorothy responded not only with a personal form of hospitality but with a political form of resisting the institutional forces leading to poverty and war. We will trace the contributions of Dorothy Day to the broader American peace movement and to the development of a society where it easier to embody love, reconciliation, and basic human decency.

#### Sunday, Feb. 8 – Rev. Fred Howard – "AMOR!"

Romantic love is an interesting paradox. Often it is an illusion, fostered by fairy tales of beautiful maidens and handsome princes and living happily ever after. However, romantic love, or amor, is also one of the greatest energy systems on the planet and can be a wonderful guide to what has meaning and purpose in life. How do we embrace this paradox and learn its lessons? The mythic story of Tristan and Isolde may be helpful to us. This morning in honor of Valentine's Day, I'll elaborate.

# Sunday, Feb. 15 -- Rev. Fred Howard, "Syncretism: A Path to World Community or Religious Identity Theft?

Syncretism is the attempt to reconcile two or more different and distinct religions and meld their beliefs and practices. On several online forums, Unitarian Universalism is listed as a syncretic religion. Is this a correct classification? Is syncretism something we should be fostering or discouraging? # Sunday, Feb. 22 – Dr. James LaPlant, "Political, Racial, and Geographic Polarization in the United States: Who Gets Heard in Contemporary American Politics?"

A speaking engagement by Ben Carson, a potential presidential candidate, last fall at VSU raised much debate about free speech and about which individuals are given a platform to espouse their views. Dr. James LaPlant will speak about the political, racial, and geographic polarization in America and who is fundamentally heard in contemporary American politics. Dr. LaPlant is a professor of Political Science and serves as Interim Dean of the Graduate School at VSU.

#### MINISTERIAL MUUSINGS



Rev. Fred Howard, February 2015

Peacemakers Camp in Macon, GA happens every summer the third week of June. The camp teaches peacemaking skills to children ages 8-13. Through the generosity of sponsors and donors and community fundraising events the children are allowed to participate free of charge. The acceptance process for participants includes a process to insure that the group is multiracial, multiethnic, and religiously diverse.

I've been a counselor there for the past seven years. It's one of the most rewarding things I've ever done. The curriculum we use focuses on character development and mentoring. Each child is assigned to a group designated by the name of a great peacemaker, like Mohandas Gandhi, Martin Luther King, Jr., or Sojourner Truth, and assuming this group identity facilitates the mentoring and learning process. Each camper wears a name badge with his group name. On the back of the badge are the Seven Steps to Conflict Resolution:

- 1) Stop. Think. Remain Calm.
- 2) Identify the problem.
- 3) Brainstorm possible solutions.
- 4) Evaluate all possibilities
- 5) Choose your solution.
- 6) Implement: Do it!
- 7) Evaluate: How did it work?

In the course of living together at the camp, attending classes, doing projects, going on field trips, eating and playing together, conflicts do occasionally arise as you might imagine with forty or so bright, energetic children. These conflicts are opportunities for the children to learn experientially. The camp counselors make use of the Seven Steps to engage the campers in resolving their own disputes. It's so gratifying to watch ten and twelve year olds resolve their issues with each other using the steps. How many times can you say you've seen adults come to terms with each other in this way? Almost always, when conflicts arise and the campers are encouraged to work through the steps, within a few minutes they have made up and are playing together again and laughing as if nothing happened. But much did happen! They learned the fine art of getting along with each other. They learned peacemaking. These little instances are what make the experience so rewarding.

Our camp has openings for counselors (adults), counselors in training (teens), and campers (age 8-13). We have a beautiful facility for the camp – the Wesleyan College campus. Room and board are provided. Please contact me if you or any member of

your family would like to participate this summer. I can promise you a wonderful experience!

## Pizza and a Movie Friday, Feb. 13, 6:30 p.m.

The film for the Friday, February 13, 2015, UU Pizza and Movie Night is: "Rabbit-Proof Fence." Please contribute \$5.00 to cover pizza and refreshments. The showing begins at 6:30 p.m.

"Rabbit-Proof Fence" Rated PG (for emotional thematic material)

The British First Fleet first introduces rabbits to Australia in 1788 to supplement food supplies. In 1859, land owner Thomas Austin releases 24 rabbits to support his hunting pleasures. By the end of the 19th century, the invasive species becomes a seemingly unstoppable plague numbering in the millions. In a futile attempt to contain them, in 1907 the Australian government builds one of many fences in Western Australia between the Indian Ocean in the north and the Southern Ocean in the south thousands of kilometers long. As rabbits proliferate, coincidentally white railroad worker fathers and others abandon their half-caste children as they help settle Australia's frontier. They become known as guadroons and octoroons. In the 20th century government agents relocate Aboriginal and mixed-race children by force to "re-education camps" in order to separate the races initiated under terms of the 1869 Aboriginal Protection Act. Director Robert Noyce and screen writer Christine Olsen base Rabbit-Proof Fence (2002) on Doris Pilkington Garimara narrative, Follow the Rabbit-Proof Fence (1996). Garimara picks up the story of government approved efforts in the 1930s to erect segregation and ethnic cleansing barriers equivalent to rabbit-fences between Whites and Aboriginals when government agents take into custody her mother, 14year-old Molly, Molly's half-caste sister, 8-year-old Daisy, and their 10-year-old cousin Gracie. Relocated to a re-education camp in 1931 at Moore River built in the Northern Territory, they fall victim to policies of Protector of Natives Dr. Cecil Cook. The White supremacist writes, "Generally by the fifth and invariably by the sixth generation, all native characteristics of the Australian Aborigine are eradicated. The problem of our half-castes will quickly be eliminated by the complete disappearance of the black race, and the swift submergence of their progeny in the white." The girls now belong to "The Stolen Generation." Despite hundreds of miles separating them from their families, they decide to escape their fate to become laborers and domestics in service to Whites by ironically following the failed rabbit fence as a lifeline for as long as it takes back to their desert

homes at Jigalong. The film follows their determined escape attempt and equally committed efforts to recapture and "protect" them from their innate humanity and native culture; and, not incidentally, to prevent their further alleged dilution and contamination of White Australian blood lines.

#### **Carol's Comments:**

An update on the Welcoming Congregation program: over the past few months, we have held sessions after the services on several Sundays. The first sessions were conversations and exercises drawn from the UUA's Living the Welcoming Congregation curriculum. These sessions focused on learning some basic concepts and terms about diversity. We had small group discussions to help us discern where we have been and where we are now – for individuals, for the congregation, and for the community. We have also had three excellent guest facilitators: Em Elliott of Georgia Equality, who focused on welcoming people who are trans; John Rogers, South Health District, who led a discussion on stigma and awareness of oppression; and Dr. Colleen Baxter, a professor of biology, who described to us the biological development of sex and gender. Attendance at most of these events have been between 15 and 20 people.

In addition, the Friday movie nights have included two pertinent films, *Chely Wright: Wish Me Away*, in November, and *Philomena*, in January. And most recently, the book group (see photo in this issue) read and discussed Janet Mock's book, *Redefining Realness: My Path to Womanhood, Identity, Love, & So Much More*.

Welcoming Congregation continues in February with additional guest speakers and with one of our annual highlight events, the Rainbow Mixer, on February 7! The Rainbow Mixer is our way of recognizing National Standing on the Side of Love Day. Why, you ask? I'll let the Standing on the Side of Love campaign answer that question: "No one should be dehumanized through acts of exclusion, oppression, or violence because of their identities. In public debates on immigrant justice, LGBTQ equality, and more, we stand on the side of love and call for respect, inclusion, and compassion."
