Ministerial Musings

Rev Fred Howard

On December 3, I read of yet another mass shooting in our country - the San Bernardino attack that left 14 people killed and 22 seriously injured. President Obama declared this an act of terrorism, and by such definition became the worst terrorist attack on US soil since September 11, 2001. Though I'm disappointed in myself for saying it, the news registered little visceral response from me - so used to such headlines I've become over the past few years. Consciously or unconsciously, I've succumbed to the same psychological defense mechanism most Americans employ to divorce themselves from the reality of news reports. As perplexing as this facet of the human situation is, it's simply the only way I'm able to get up the next day and read the newspaper or look at the internet again.

What did command my attention was the headline of New York's *Daily News* about this attack, "God Isn't Fixing This," the headline flanked by tweets from various politicians with the word "prayer" highlighted. The *Daily News*, provocative in its call for stricter gun control, obviously meant for the article to shame the pols into getting off their knees and enacting stricter gun control legislation. This headline got people's attention and evoked wide ranging responses – some calling it "brilliant," and some "deplorable."

A notable response to this headline from one perspective on the gun control conversation: "Ironically, enough, the 'Don't Just Pray There, Do Something' meme will actually keep things from happening. After all, some of our biggest obstacles to policy solutions of any kind is an ideologically fractured populace where virtually every issue is a test of political purity. If you shame away the most human aspects of public life — such as the call to pray for one another — you will find this situation worsening, not getting better. After all, we learn to listen to one another, and even work together, because we see one another as fellow humans, fellow citizens, as people of goodwill, not just as avatars to be warred against on a screen." (Dr. Russell Moore, the head of the Southern Baptist

Convention's Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission.)

And from another perspective:
"The Daily News' front page is not, in any way, shape or form, condemning prayer or religion.
Anyone suggesting otherwise is either — intentionally or unintentionally — misconstruing the point, which is that most GOP politicians have offered nothing but empty platitudes and angry rhetoric in response to the ongoing plague of gun violence in our country." (Jim Rich, editor in chief of the Daily News)

Both of these responses are notable for their civility in the heated exchanges that the headline and the article sparked. That's what's missing in the conversation over this, like so many, crucial issue(s) of our time. Civility. But to have discourse, even a civil public one, someone has to incite the emotions of people to get them to begin conversations. And for that, I commend the *Daily News*.

The film for Pizza and a Movie Night is *House of Sand and Fog*, which was originally scheduled for November. Thank you for donating \$5.00 for pizza and drinks. Rating: R (for some violence/disturbing images, language and a scene of sexuality)

A film capable of shedding light on implications of immigrant diversity trends affecting America's view of itself is Director Vadim Perelman's House of Sand and Fog (2003). Co-writer Perelman and Shawn Lawrence Otto present how Massoud Amir (Ben Kingsley), originally a Behrani, recognizes an opportunity to climb higher on the American dream's upward mobility ladder, but at the cost of an American woman, Kathy Lazaro (Jennifer Connelly). As a naturalized citizen, he is entitled to the same benefits of a woman naturally possessing American birthrights. When Kathy fails to open her mail responsibly due to her lapse in fighting alcoholism following her husband leaving her, she falls behind paying property taxes and loses her house. To pursue her dream to return to sobriety and normalcy she fights to regain the house. When Deputy Sheriff Lester Burdon (Ron Eldard) becomes passionate about Kathy, he illegally attempts to come to her aid. Kathy's Public Defender (Frances Fisher) argues with Amir the right thing to do is to return the purchase money to help her restore her grounding to place. Amir must choose between helping a fellow American rebuild her life, or build a new life for his immigrant family in her former home. What is the right thing for decent Americans to decide when they possess comparable moral claims to equally legitimate entitlements and hopes?
