Sunday Services

Sunday, January 5 – Rev. Fred Howard, "Searching the Stars"

Human beings have searched the night sky from time immemorial. The stars pique our curiosity, and compel us to search for answers. Sometimes they may just furnish a backdrop for us to contemplate our existence and to put it in perspective. Today is Epiphany Sunday, the time in the traditional church year when the visit of the magi to the baby Jesus is celebrated. One way to understand that story is in terms of the perspective it gives us on the human situation. Nearly two thousand years later, the astronomer Carl Sagan gave us another story that invites us to some similar speculation. Just as a star beckoned to the first century magi, so too did a star beckon to Ellie Arroway, the protagonist in the movie *Contact*. I will offer a reflection on the similarities of these stories today, and how both stories can continue to teach and inspire us.

Sunday, January 12 – Dr. Michael Stoltzfus, "Love as Spiritual Practice"

What is love? How many types of love are there? How do we cultivate, develop, sustain, practice, embody, and receive love? What do some of the great spiritual traditions have to say about these questions? How are deeply rooted spiritual responses different from contemporary cultural perspectives? Our topic will be love as spiritual practice.

Sunday, January 19 - – Rev. Fred Howard, "Southern Liberalism and the Legacy of Atticus Finch"

Hard to believe, but Harper Lee's novel "To Kill a Mockingbird" is now over fifty years old. The hero of the story, Atticus Finch, has been inspiring the idealistic minded to enter the legal profession for altruistic reasons for over a generation. Recently, however, the book has come under rather harsh criticism and has even been banned from educational use in some school systems. The controversy itself can be a useful educational tool as it highlights how different the struggle for civil rights is today as compared to fifty years ago. This morning I'll share some personal reflections on the book and some thoughts on this controversy and invite you to consider some of these issues with me. So today I will plan to hold a facilitated conversation on the sermon topic and this timely subject immediately after meet and greet.

Sunday, January 26 - Ubaraj Katawal, "The Brahman in Humans and Animals"

In Hindu and Native American traditions, nature plays an important role to cure a person suffering from mental or physical wounds. In Native American tradition, animals function as a connection between the land and the people. A person suffering from mental illnesses such as war-fatigue can reconnect with the past by help from animals, and find meaning in life once again. Similarly, most animals are revered and worshipped in Hindu tradition. A tiger, for example, is vehicle of Durga, the goddess of ferocity. These traditions hold that since brahman or higher spirit resides in both humans and animals, learning the ways of animals can help us to know the brahman within ourselves. Dr. Ubaraj Katawal is an Assistant Professor of English at Valdosta State University. He is a newcomer to VSU and a specialist on 20th and 21st post-colonial literature. Welcome him to UU Valdosta.

MINISTERIAL MUUSINGS

Rev. Fred Howard January 2014

Nelson Mandela died on December 5. World leaders, celebrities, journalists, our own Peter Morales, most anyone positioned to command the attention of others has been falling over themselves to offer a tribute to him. Mandela is, perhaps, the last great example from the 20th century of how one person can make a real difference in the world. I've read and heard many of these tributes and have been almost uniformly disappointed. One exception being that of Swarthmore College's Timothy Burke, which you can read at https://blogs.swarthmore.edu/burke/blog/2013/12/06/be-nelson-mandela/

As I understood Mandela the man, it would seem to me that the real takeaway he would want us to get from his life is this: Where should we be looking for the next Mandela? That probably won't be in the privileged halls of power and influence. That kind of prestige comes only rarely to one such as a Mandela, and that only after they have taken the really significant actions of their life. It'll be in those places where the rare individual who dares to speak out against the forces of institutional oppression are typically to be found. Places where dissidents are found. Places like prisons, picket lines, perhaps in asylum over in some other country or the embassy of another nation. Even perhaps somewhere like the internet, if we search past the ubiquitous saturation of our mainstream media to where, if diligent enough, we might find their prophetic words on some obscure blog.

A few people really seemed to get Mandela. I can only hope that I'm one of them.

On a completely different note, I just wanted to offer an update on Kathy. She began chemotherapy and radiation on December 16th. If attitude is important to the success of cancer treatment, and everyone who has experience with treatment of cancer tells us it is, then she is in a great place. Because her attitude has been wonderful, and continues to amaze and inspire me and the rest of our family and friends. Please continue to keep us in your thoughts and prayers.

PIZZA AND A MOVIE

The film for the January 10, 2014, UU Pizza and Movie Night is: *North Country*. Please contribute \$5.00 to cover pizza and refreshments. The showing begins at 6:30 p.m.

Director Niki Caro dramatizes in North Country (2005 Rated R) Lois Jenson's resistance to sexual discrimination after she became a coal miner in 1975. In 1991, Jenson v. Eveleth Taconite Co. became the first sexual harassment case to be given class action status. Caro fictionalizes Jenson in the character Josey Aimes (Charlize Theron). Aimes, a single mother, gains employment in one of the best paying positions available in North Minnesota: a coal miner in the North Country where only one miner in 30 is a Most townspeople, including her father, Hank woman. (Richard Jenkins), consider mining men's work. This conceit considers a female miner a thief of a man's job. Glory (Frances McDormand) disagrees. She avoids confrontation, becomes a miner, and serves as the only woman on the union negotiating committee. McDormand conveys her character in this film as persuasively as she portrays the police officer she plays in Fargo. Aimes's natural beauty and independence attract unwanted attention from male miners. They resent her presence; but, they also find her irresistible. Rumors about why she did not remarry characterize her as a tramp. And, they allege she stirs up female co-workers. Bullying, obscenities, and groping culminate in an assault on Aimes from Bobby Sharp (Jeremy Renner). She seeks legal redress with help from lawyer Bill White (Woody Harrelson). Settled in 1998, case precedent increased *discovery* process limits in sexual harassment cases and allowed psychological injuries Jenson suffered in assessing damage awards.

The book is "Things Fall Apart" by Chinua Achebe. "The novel shows the life of Okonkwo, a leader and local wrestling champion in Umuofia—one of a fictional group of nine villages in Nigeria, inhabited by the Igbo people (in the novel, "Ibo"). It describes his family and personal history, the customs and society of the Igbo, and the influence of British colonialism and Christian missionaries on the Igbo community during the late nineteenth century." (Wikipedia) The book was published in 1958 and is widely read across Africa and elsewhere. The author, who won many awards during his lifetime, died this past March.

Bring a dish to share and join in the fellowship and discussion. It's always better if you have read the book but we welcome you whether you have or not. During the first hour we fellowship over our potluck meal and then move into a circle to have a discussion. We try to wind up by about 9 PM at the latest. We continue to choose books about difference.
