## Sermon at UU church: Rev. Fred Howard, "Love Has No Color: Painting Life by Numbers"

The biblical book of Numbers is not exactly a "go to" book when it comes to composing an engaging sermon, but a recent event in south Georgia took me back to one of the stories contained in this 4th book of the Torah. This morning I'll be sharing some thoughts on this event that went "viral" in our online social media and how it intriguingly echoes some struggles of the Hebrew people in the aftermath of their release from captivity in Egypt.

Instead of imposing behavior from without by demanding assimilation, Save Our Children provides an opportunity and an incentive to change their thinking about their behavior....

## Sunday, July 28 – Dr. Dick Saeger, "An Update on Recent Supreme Court Decisions"

The Supreme Court of the United States recently struck down portions of the Voting Rights Act as well as portions of the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA). Dr. Dick Saeger will discuss these recent decisions, as well as other topics. Dr. Saeger is Professor Emeritus from Valdosta State University's Political Sciences Department.

#### PRESIDENT'S CORNER **CAROL STILES**

This summer, let me spring upon you a topic no one wants to talk about - finances! In many ways, we are in reasonably good shape - our normal expenses and income were about in line with last year's budget. As you know, we replaced the HVAC system for the sanctuary, a portion of which we financed; that is currently our only debt and, thanks to some special donations, we are on our way to paying that off. Prior to that, though, many of you noticed the new lights in the parking lot, especially in the new parking area. The costs for the lights and installation was approximately \$3700. finance this, the board opted to dip into our 'general fund,' rather than taking on debt at that time.

So, our challenge for the upcoming year is how to rebuild our general fund for items that come up that are not on our budget. After the spring cleanup in April, the volunteers discussed possible fundraising events for fall when the weather cools, and we can make use of our beautiful grounds for some kind of fund-raising activity – possibly a low-country boil, fall festival, and / or other fund-raising activities. Please let us know of ideas that you may have that will help us with fundraising this year....

The major source of our funding is, of course, "people like you." For those of you who are new to our congregation as visitors and have wondered how to contribute, please consider joining our congregation as new members -Rev. Fred Howard, Kimberly Tanner, or I would be happy to talk to you about membership. However, you do not have to officially join to make a pledge in support of the church – just let Rosie Asbury or I know that you wish to make a pledge as part of your personal budget. Contributions then can be placed in the collection plate, marked as "pledge" for that month.

The benefits are endless – in my view, particularly the contentment of knowing that you are a part of a community that embraces diversity in spirituality and in life and provides "a place to celebrate life's passages and to join in social action on behalf of local and global communities." #### Notes from Kids' RE - Sue Bailey

We have been busy exploring our planet earth, the home we share with all living things. The children are working on a variety of "creature" crafts as we learn about the importance of taking care of our world. We've found out some interesting facts about different creatures. For example, did you know that not all starfish have 5 arms; some have 10, 20, and even 40! Starfish can also lose an arm and grow a new one. Sometimes a new starfish grows from the lost arm because that's where most of its vital organs are located. We are currently focusing on starfish, crabs, barnacles, and other creatures that live in the ocean's tidal pools and are busy creating an exhibit of life in a tidal pool. ## Let's Have Some Fun!! PIZZA AND A MOVIE

Friday, July 19 6: 30 PM at the church

Please contribute \$5.00 to cover pizza and refreshments. The showing of Live Schreiber's film "Everything is Illuminated" begins at 6:30 PM. Fred Howard and David Rogers are the contacts for this event. Let them know if you have suggested films for the future.

In his 2005 film, Everything is Illuminated, Liev Schreiber brilliantly alludes to living and dead memories radiating from Ukrainian landscapes. Beautiful settings provide the context for Jonathon (Elijah Wood), a young, American Jew, to hire Alex (Eugene Hutz) and his grandfather Alex (Boris Leskin) as his translator and driver, respectively, to help him his search for the woman who saved his grandfather's life during the Holocaust. Jonathon's penchant for collecting family memorabilia and unraveling family stories eventually compels him to journey to the Ukraine to participate in what locals term "tours of dead Jews," travels to graves if they exist, and to bleak, empty sites of former shtetls, Jewish villages dating from the 1200s. Tour participants search of meaning behind factual accounts comprising Holocaust history and for opportunities to honor dead family members or ancestors by visiting killing grounds bloodied by the Nazi's and Ukrainian sympathizers. Unbeknownst to the Gentile viewer, but likely well-understood by many Orthodox Jewish filmgoers, Schreiber alludes to the shtetl version of yeshiva, a tradition in which men devote themselves to Talmudic study of the Torah, as well as to careful analysis of everyday street life, in order to gain wisdom. Both forms of study analyze and reanalyze experiences as bases for revealing meanings behind meanings, ramifications of oral and written traditions, and secondary consequences of events. Jonathon epitomizes one face of the contradictory identity of the yeshiva male by his austere, laconic language reduced to mere hints to explain his hoarding tendency to the younger Alex. His habit verges on an obsessive compulsive disorder when it renders him at times socially dysfunctional as he collects seemingly ordinary as well as extraordinary objects alluding to his family and his

life. It seems to make no difference if an allusion suggests meaning only to him. Not content to humor the viewer with relatively more obvious allusions to shtetl life during the comedic first half of the film, Schreiber devises corrective allusions in which an object's imitation opposes the original source's intentions, and which ultimately frustrate this interpretation. For example, although not a Jew, Alex exemplifies for Schreiber the opposite characteristic of the laconic shtetl male represented by Jonathon, namely, the voluble, loquacious interpreter. However, Alex casually mutilates language by his lack of understanding American culture, not to mention ignorance of English, in many translations. And, he avoids translating anti-Semitic remarks by Grandfather Alex for Jonathon as they penetrate more and more into the countryside in pursuit of evidence of his tragic heritage. Thus, although the film begins with humorous events in the present, as old and young Alex, accompanied by Sammy Davis Jr. Jr., the grandfather's bitch, seeing-eye dog, launch Jonathon's search for his grandfather's shtetl, the fictional Trachimbrod, tragic darkness eventually casts long, painful, shadows of true meaning across verbal and artifactual allusions when, incredibly, the trio stumbles upon the older sister of the heroine Jonathon seeks. The film's conclusion leaves the viewer to determine whether or not Schreiber succeeds in conflating multiple references in his allusions into an illuminated fusion capable of transforming cultural traditions.

Book Discussion and Potluck: The next discussion and potluck will be Friday, August 9. The book is "The Left Hand of Darkness" by Ursula Le Guin. This is a book which among other issues deals with the significance of gender. The story takes place on a planet where the humanoid inhabitants at different times during their life cycle, are biologically female and at other times male. It is an interesting story which raises provocative questions about gender roles. Contact Betty Derrick if you have books to suggest. The group chooses books related to difference. Plan to join the discussion in August.
