Zoom Talk: General Assembly 2020

Wednesday, July 22, 7:00 p.m.

The Unitarian Universalist Association held our first every virtual General Assembly, which included nearly 5,000 participants! Many could

participate because it was virtual: more affordable, less travel, able to participate from home.

Kimberly Tanner and Brett Bailey served as our delegates to GA and will tell us about their experiences as well as some of the major decisions that were made at GA this year.

Zoom Talk: Dr. Dixie Haggard, "Seeking Recognition for the Pascagoula River Tribe"

From Valdosta State University: Dr. Dixie
Haggard has been fighting for years to help a
Native American tribe in Mississippi gain federal
recognition and reclaim what has been lost through
centuries of intense hostility and discrimination.

Dr. Haggard is a professor of history at VSU. He was selected as a 2019 Governor's Teaching Fellow program offered through the Institute of Higher Education at the University of Georgia

We will begin a series of discussions about "How to be an Anti-racist" beginning with a book of that title by Ibram X. Kendi.
