Sunday Services

Sunday, March 6 – Rev. Fred Howard, "I Will Survive"

Stories shape our lives. Some of you may recognize that sentence as the opening line to my book. In the past year I've discovered yet another aspect to that truth. The story that shapes our lives more than any other one is the story we tell ourselves about ourselves. This morning I'll invite you to examine with me the story you're telling yourself as we consider together which elements in these stories are life affirming and which ones we might want to discard.

Sunday, March 20 50th Anniversary Celebration! Rev. Mary Louise DeWolf, "Rational Spirituality"

In my experience, Unitarian Universalists don't often talk about spirituality, and when asked about it they do not know what to say. What does spiritual mean? Not logical but meaningful? Feeling, not thinking? Can Unitarian Universalists be spiritual? Are other denominations spiritual?

Rev. Mary Louise DeWolf was one of the founding members of the Unitarian Universalist church of Valdosta – see her biography elsewhere in this issue.

Share the Plate Sunday Offering: Donations to the plate this Sunday, not otherwise designated as pledges, will be donated to Lowndes Area Crisis Care (LACC). LACC is organized by area churches to provide short-term financial help for those in emergency need. Individuals seeking assistance will be referred to LACC to help determine the best way to help during financial crises. LACC is in the middle of a major fundraising campaign: nearly \$10,000 was utilized last year to help individuals in need, but LACC needs to raise more funds to be able to re-open the office at Lowndes County Social Services Building, 601 N. Lee St. on a regular schedule. Rev. Fred Howard is involved in this endeavor along with other ministers from the Valdosta Area Ministerial Association (VAMA).

Sunday, March 27 – Rev. Fred Howard, "Paradigms of Resurrection from Many Faiths – Perhaps Even No Faith At All"

Many Unitarian Universalist ministers are challenged by the prospect of preaching an Easter sermon. It seems daunting to them to deal honestly with the resurrection paradigm while also remaining in good standing with the skeptics and scientific minded. I relish the challenge. This morning we'll be hearing voices from four traditions about this paradigm – Christianity, Paganism, Atheism, and Unitarian Universalism and the positive messages each tradition can glean from it.

50th Anniversary!

We're throwing a party for our 50th Anniversary on Sunday, March 20th! That day, we will host a special service, with Rev. Mary Louise DeWolf, as our speaker. After the service, we will have dinner on the grounds and a special celebration. Dee Tait has agreed to chair the organizing committee, please let us know if you're willing to help!

Mary Louise DeWolf and Harold M. (Bud) Evans were founders of the Unitarian Fellowship of Valdosta (which is actually our official name) in 1965. In December, 1965, application for formal membership in the Unitarian Universalist Association was filed with 14 charter members, including Jim and Josette Ingram. Congratulations to UU Valdosta!! We have received notification from the UUA that we have earned Welcoming Congregation status! This designation is the result, specifically, of our work together in after-service sessions with the Living the Welcoming Congregation UUA Curriculum last year, as well as the multicultural curricula we are using this year, Examining Whiteness: An Antiracism Curriculum and Building the World We Dream About.

But, to us, this designation is also recognition of our *decades* of work in outreach to the LGBTQ community here in Valdosta. In future issues, we will share some portions of our application that will describe this outreach.

Meanwhile, here is a short excerpt from the letter from Annette Marquis, UUA LGBTQ and Multicultural Programs Director: "It was a pleasure to read about what you have accomplished and the powerful work you have done. I'm always struck when a small congregation such as yours takes on this important mission. UFV has done the work of becoming a Welcoming Congregation with dedication and purpose. You can be quite proud of your efforts."

Welcome back, Rev. Mary Louise DeWolf!

The Reverend Mary Louise DeWolf is a second generation native Floridian. After receiving her BS in Science Education and Master of Education from the University of Florida, she spent thirty-three years teaching biology and chemistry in the public schools of Florida, Georgia, California, England and the Florida Community College in Jacksonville. This was followed by eight years as a Co-District Executive in the Florida and Mid-South Districts of the Unitarian Universalist Association. During this time Rev. DeWolf began her preparation for ministry. She later received a MA in Religious Studies at the University of South Florida and Final Fellowship from the Unitarian Universalist Association. She served as part-time minister at Nature Coast Unitarian Universalists in Citrus Springs, Florida for seven years, retired from ministry in 2010, and was awarded Minister Emerita. Reverend Mary Louise lives in Crystal River, FL. She will be our guest minister on March 20th for the 50th Anniversary celebration.

Ministerial Musings Rev Fred Howard

We have many special happenings at the church this month! Among them:

Sunday, March 20 will be our 50th Anniversary celebration. I hope everyone can make it. Many former members have contacted us and plan to be there, so it will be much like a homecoming. Please plan to stay for the meal afterwards and take this opportunity to connect with our congregation's past, present and future.

Sunday, March 27 will also be a special service. It's Easter Sunday. I've always wondered why attendance is always so good at Unitarian Universalist services on Easter. I think part of the allure is for the entertainment value of watching the minister struggle as she/he swims against the strong current of improbability contained in the traditional Easter message. I won't discourage anyone from coming for that reason, but if that's your hope, I'm afraid the service this year may be a disappointment. Rather than take on the grand mythmiracle-mystery that is Easter by myself, this year I'm inviting other faith perspectives to join with me in offering reflections on this season's high drama. Deborah Marine-Hill and I have been collaborating on this service and I'm excited about the possibilities of the innovative worship experience we're planning. So much looking forward to seeing everyone there!

As a sort of meditation in preparation for this worship experience, I offer the following excerpt:

"The Easter story is just that—a story. It was likely meant to bring hope to a community caught in a seemingly hopeless situation. Easter, however, isn't something that might or might not have happened two millennia ago. Easter happens every day when people act in the world as agents of hope. When people live their lives in this way, they bear witness to Easter. When they act in ways that put hope and possibility before another human being, they're plotting a resurrection. Maybe it's the possibility of a full stomach, a better tomorrow, or that one day the moral arc of the universe will bend toward justice. Perhaps it's the possibility that something good can come from what today appears hopeless.

To bring hope is to bring life—new life where once there was none. Bringing hope requires we remain faithful to our commitments and that we enter into community with each other with a sense of expectancy, knowing that sometimes it's going to require us to be creative and flexible. Resurrection is not merely about one human overcoming death. Resurrection is more about all humanity overcoming darkness and despair to emerge from these things that entomb the soul into the light of hope and courage and purpose." 1
