Sunday Services

Sunday, May 6 – Rev. Fred Howard, "What Happened to Virtue?"

Virtues are very different than values. Virtues are qualities of character. Things like compassion, thoughtfulness, gentleness, and honesty are virtues. Values, on the other hand, are qualities more relative to the person or culture that holds them. Gangs have values. Hitler had values. Values are relative to the individual or group that holds them and may or may not be reflections of admirable virtues. Today we hear very little about virtues – neither in UU circles nor in society in general. Why is that? Its actually a rather fascinating state of affairs. This morning I'll share some of my research and thoughts on the topic.

11:00 AM - Service at UU Church: Speaker: Rev. Fred Howard, "Dealing with Difficult People – Jesus Style"

The incident recorded in the Gospel of John, chapter 8, traditionally referred to as the story of the woman caught in adultery, has much to teach us in this regard. This morning I will share some insights from the story that have been helpful to me in my search for ways to function better in interpersonal conflict.

Ministerial Musings

April 2018

Come Sunday dramatizes the story of Carlton Pearson's excommunication for espousing Universalist views. The movie premiered on Netflix in April. It is informative viewing for those seeking to better understand the Universalist strand of our faith tradition. The film could have also been made much more interesting by adding in this little tidbit - today Pearson preaches at one of the largest UU congregations in the world, All Souls Unitarian in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Regrettably, the movie leaves viewers hanging at the end and doesn't finish the story by revealing Pearson's redemption when he and his faithful remnant are taken in by the UU Tulsa congregation. As much as Hollywood loves a good redemption story, I find it odd that they leave Pearson's story truncated. Still, I highly recommend the movie if you get a chance to see it.

Pearson claims he received a revelation from God in 1996 as he was watching a newscast about the refugee crisis in Rwanda. Sitting in front of his big screen TV with a plate full of food, he watched the women and children with emaciated bodies and swollen bellies and no light or life in their eyes trying to make their way back home. Pearson assumed they were not Christian and were therefore bound for hell. And he was completely overwhelmed. In that moment, Pearson firmly believes it was the Spirit of God in his own heart that said to him, "We're not sucking those dear people in to hell. Can't you see they're already there- in the hell you have created for them and continue to create for yourselves and others all over the planet? We redeemed and reconciled all of humanity at Calvary."

This was a powerful message for someone who had received all his nurture in the born again, bible thumping, holy rolling, hell-fire and brimstone world of Pentecostal Christianity. Pearson took away from this epiphany an intense conviction that the whole world is already saved, to use the vernacular of Christendom, whether they are believing Christians, or Muslims, Jews, Buddhist, atheists, gays, it simply doesn't matter in God's eyes. It was a powerful message. And a dangerous one, as Pearson would soon come to find, when he began to preach it from his pulpit.

I won't give any more spoilers because I certainly want you to see the movie if you can. But I urge you to pay particular attention to the irrefutable logic Pearson uses in his sermon to his congregation explaining his newfound theology. It caused a seismic shift in his world. Just not the one he envisioned.

I look forward to the conversations that will follow your viewing of this interesting and provocative film.

Georgia Conflict Center

John Lash, Executive Director of the Georgia Conflict Center, was our guest speaker on Sunday, April 29. The Georgia Conflict Center is an Athensbased nonprofit that addresses violence through skill building and restorative approaches to conflict and harm. His own path started with a commitment to violence as a way of life, leading to his nearly 25 years of imprisonment. In prison he discovered the path of nonviolence and began to apply it to his own life and the prison community. After his release in 2009 he attended Kennesaw State University's M.S. in Conflict Management program, focusing his work and research on community based peace building and restorative justice. He has served as the director of GCC since 2013.
