Sunday Services

Sunday, November 4 – "Service of Remembrance" – Mary Thieme

We will have a Service of Remembrance, inspired in part by the Mexican Day of the Dead Celebration, Día de los Muertos. We hope you will bring a photograph or other remembrance of someone you have lost to share.

Sunday, November 11 - Kimberly Tanner, "What it means to Side with Love"

The history of the *Side with Love* campaign (formerly the *Standing of the Side of Love* campaign) will be discussed along with ways that the movement continues to fight injustice in our world. In particular, we will learn about the recent name change and how it represents the fight against ableist language. Finally, we will contemplate how we can actively *Side with Love* in our local community and beyond. The message will include a sermon entitled, "Revolutionary Love" by UU minister, Emily Wright-Magoon.

Plan to stay after the service for a light potluck lunch and a card-making gathering for South Georgia Immigrant Support Network.

Sunday, November 18 – Guest at Your Table (GAYT) Kick-off Service

Guest at Your Table (GAYT) is the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee's annual intergenerational program to raise support for and awareness about key human rights issues. The program is an opportunity to celebrate grassroots partnership, support human rights, and learn about just four of these individuals – the "guests" in Guest at Your Table. The theme for this year "Justice Across Borders," focusing on: "Partnering with grassroots allies along the Central American migration trail, UUSC addresses root causes, supports migrants in transit, and protects the right to seek asylum."

Each person / family will receive a GAYT donations box or envelope and information on joining and supporting UUSC.

Sunday, November 25 – Rev. Anna Hall, "From Organized Religion to Organizing Religion."

Author, speaker and activist Brian McLaren has challenged progressive congregations to move from organized religion to organizing religion.

Anna Hall explores what this shift looks like on the local level. She will share insights from her work with the Convergence Leadership Project, which works to train clergy and laypeople to answer this question: How can our congregations act as constructive change agents in their communities?

Solidarity With All Those Who Live in Fear

Response from Rev. Mary Katherine Morn, President and CEO of UUSC, on recent events, Oct. 28, 2018

Our hearts are heavy with grief for the desecration of sanctuaries by hate and violence. We hold in our hearts those whose lives were taken yesterday at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh. And those who survived.

We also hold in our hearts Maurice Stallard and Vickie Lee Jones, apparently killed for being black at a grocery store after their assailant attempted to enter a black church with his weapons and his hate.

And we hold Matthew Sheppard, laid to rest this week at the National Cathedral because his parents live in fear (after twenty years) that his grave will be desecrated.

May we commit to solidarity with all those who live in fear because of who they are, what they worship, whom they love. May we resist the urge to hate in response to hate. And may we resist resignation, which is as dangerous as hate.

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote

- The inherent dignity and worth of every person,
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations,
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations,
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning,
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large,
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all,
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

Grateful for the religious pluralism, which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant promising to one anther our mutual trust and support.
