Sunday Services

Sunday, Oct. 2 – Rev. Fred Howard, "Forgiveness from the Inside Out"

Tomorrow, October 3, is Rosh Hashannah, the Jewish New Year. Rosh Hashannah begins a ten day period known as the High Holy Days, or Days of Repentance, which culminate on Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, the holiest day of the year for our Jewish friends. Repentance and atonement are parts of the larger spiritual process required of all people, regardless of their faith tradition - the process of forgiveness. This morning I'll reflect on this process, using some insights I gained from watching the Pixar movie "Inside Out" with my grandchildren.

Sunday, Oct. 9 – Rev. Anna Hall, "Changed for Good"

The world is always changing. Change and transition are constant in our lives, our organizations and our communities. In my research on congregations experiencing transitions, I learned that there is great potential for individual and collective transformation during times of change. I will discuss my research and ideas in this area, including practical advice for how we might harness the changes in our own lives for personal transformation.

Sunday, Oct. 16 – Rev. Fred Howard, "Ghoulies and Ghosties: Wonder, Mystery, and the Theology of Halloween"

Certain sects of the church discourage participation in the rites of Halloween. Recently I've been doing some research on the horror genre in art and entertainment, and discovered there's a complex psychological and spiritual rationale for this wholesale rejection of a celebration that, to a certain way of understanding, is actually profoundly Christian. This morning I'll share some thoughts on this fascinating subject.

Share the Plate Sunday Offering: Donations to the plate this Sunday, not otherwise designated as pledges, will go to Habitat for Humanity. The Habitat for Humanity "Building on Faith" build is usually scheduled for November. This is an annual

Sunday, Oct. 23 – Deborah Marine, "Samhain: Celebrating the Harvest and Remembering the Dearly Departed"

Deb Marine will reflect upon the changing of the seasons and lead us in remembering and honoring our ancestors at this time of Samhain. Samhain, celebrated by pagans at the end of October, is a celebration of the end of the harvest and a time to honor the dead, those who have passed in the last year as well as all of our ancestors who came before us.

Deb Marine is a founding member of the Oaken Circle CUUPS chapter, which meets on Wednesday evenings at the UU church.

Sunday, Oct. 30 – Rev. George Bennett, "People of the Land"

Jesus and the Bible clearly and consistently have a bias toward the poor, the foreigner, and the marginalized. Most Churches have ignored this truth by diverting attention from what Jesus taught. As Jesus himself put it, "You strain out gnats and you swallow camels!" (Matthew 23:24)

Ministerial Musings Rev Fred Howard

Several of you commented on my sermon last month on prejudice. I could tell there would be pushback from the minute I began speaking. I could see it in your eyes. That's good. The energy in the room went up. Those of you who made comments, I commend you. It always takes courage to speak your mind. And when I hear honest commentary from those of you who disagree, it lets me know that I'm doing my job.

The role of the minister, in my understanding, is three pronged. First, to bring out the spiritual aspects of a topic or issue. Second, to affirm. Third, to challenge. The first two are relatively easy. A minister gets a lot of pats on the back for these, especially if she or he does them well. It's that third one that presents the most difficulty.

No matter how well I prepare, how secure I am in what I'm saying, it's still difficult when someone disagrees with me or tells me they don't like what I said. But that's not the greatest difficulty. The hardest part is the self-examination that must be done. I know this is hard to believe, but sometimes I'm wrong. That may be hard for some of you to swallow I know, but it's true. And part of every minister's job, actually a part of everyone's job, if they strive to function in a healthy way, is to be willing to admit that. Once I admit that, it means I must be vigilant, I must always be ready to do the proper self-examination that this admission requires. That's the really hard part of being a good human being and especially being a good minister.

Our community is strong and healthy. I know this, because people call me on things. And, in turn, I trust that you as individuals are whole and healthy and that I need not fear challenging you as well. May we continue to live in the healthy give and take that healthy communities always have so that we, in turn, can be a vital part of creating a better world.

Interfaith Pride Service

The 2016 Interfaith Pride Service was held on Sunday Sept 18th at the church. Our guest speakers, Rev. Linda Herzer and Gabrielle Claiborne addressed *The Genesis Gender Dilemma*. Gabrielle shared with us her life story, especially about coming out as a transgender woman. Rev. Linda pointed out that verses in Genesis can be interpreted to include people of all genders, rather than using the Bible to exclude people from the faith tradition and alienate them from their religious community.

The collection from the Interfaith Pride Service will be divided between the two Gay-Straight Alliances (GSAs) that were started in Berrien and Cook County High Schools last year to support them in their activities.

A reception and time to visit followed – thanks to all who brought dessert and snacks. The service was supported by funds from our Accepting Difference Project.
