Sunday Services

Sunday, October 1 - Rev. Fred Howard, "To Aid and Abet Creation: It's Why We're Here"

What does it take to be creative? What part does the spiritual life play in our creativity? This morning I'll offer some thoughts and share some personal experience about this fascinating subject.

Sunday, October 8 – Rev. Fred Howard, "Ingathering and Water Communion Service" (re-scheduled from Sept. 10 - potluck to follow!)

Today we will celebrate our annual ritual of water communion. Bring a small jar or vial of water from some significant place on your summer journey, and a brief story to share. I will also share a brief homily based on Rachel Carson's short story, "A Fable for Tomorrow."

Sunday, October 15 – Rev. Fred Howard, "Unitarian Gothic"

Gothic horror stories played a large part in shaping our modern festival of Halloween. The Unitarian branch of our faith has distinct connections to the most famous of these macabre tales. Exploring these connections will also give us a chance to explore some of the rich history of our tradition.

Share the Plate Sunday: Donations to the plate this Sunday, not otherwise designated as pledges, will go to Habitat for Humanity. The Habitat for Humanity "Building on Faith" build is usually scheduled for November. This is an annual collaboration among churches to raise funds and build a Habitat house or two during a one-week blitz-build.

Sunday, October 22 – Rev. George Bennett, "Braving the Wilderness"

This sermon is inspired by Brene Brown's book, Braving the Wilderness: The Quest for True Belonging and the Courage to Stand Alone. The inspirational passage for the sermon is based on Dr. Maya Angelou's comment with Bill Moyers on a PBS show in 1973: "You are only free when you realize you belong no place---you belong every place---no place at all. The price is high. The reward is great."

Sunday, October 29 – Kimberly Tanner and Carol Stiles, "UU White Supremacy Teach-In"

Today's service will have a different format as we join other UU congregations for another Teach-In about white supremacy. Come prepared to *participate* in this teach-in during the service.

Black Lives of UU states "in order for us to be more effective at tackling the white supremacy beyond our walls, we must also identify ways in which systems of supremacy and inequality live within our faith and our lives."

Although these teach-ins began last spring as a response to hiring practices within the UUA, our raised awareness is now even more timely and important after the events of Charlottesville (see the excerpted statement from UUA President Susan Frederick-Gray about Charlottesville elsewhere in this newsletter). In addition, a debate is raging nationally about professional athletes who are protesting racism in law enforcement by kneeling for the national anthem before sporting events.

Betty Derrick Memorial Lecture and Discussion Friday October 6, 7:00 p.m.

The speaker is Dr. Dennis Marks and his title is "The **U**nity of the **U**niverse." Dr. Marks is a long-time friend of Betty Derrick and is Professor Emeritus of the Department of Physics, Astronomy, and Geosciences, Valdosta State University. Dr. Marks is also chair of the Literacy program for the Rotary Club of Valdosta and chair of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library project, which is sponsored locally by the Valdosta Rotary Clubs.

Ministerial Musings Rev Fred Howard

This month we'll resume our second hour program of viewing selected TED Talks. One that I'm particularly interested in showing is "The Moral Roots of Liberals and Conservatives," by Jonathan Haidt.

In the talk, Haidt takes a humorous look at a basic human personality trait called "openness to experience" and shows pretty convincingly that understanding this trait can not only help us understand human behavior, but also help us understand people's political affinities. The audience Haidt is addressing considers itself overwhelmingly liberal on social issues (not unlike virtually all UU congregations) and Haidt says that this is a problem. "If the goal is to better understand the world," Haidt says, "the general lack of moral diversity is going to make it harder when all people share the same values. They become a team, and once you engage the psychology of teams, it shuts down open minded thinking."

With this teaser, I invite you to join us after meet and greet on Sunday, October 1 to view this interesting, informative, and provocative TED Talk. Feel free to view it beforehand as this will give you a chance to think more deeply about the point Haidt is making before our conversation. Though the political backdrop is a bit dated (the talk was done in 2008), in some ways I think the topic is now more relevant than ever given the widening political divide facing our country in light of more recent elections and recent events. Come and join the conversation.

Love Showed Up Today in Charlottesville

August 12, 2017, excerpted from post on FB

Today was a tragic day. We came to Charlottesville to bear peaceful witness but were met with hate and racist violence. My heart has been broken and I am deeply troubled by what is happening in this community and across this country. ...

This morning, the faith leaders that were called here by **Congregate C'ville** went to Emancipation Park to block the entrance and prevent the Unite the Right rally from taking place. The message was clear – to stand with the community to say that hate has no place here. The white nationalist protesters we faced chanted Nazi slogans like "you will not replace us" and "blood and soil" in between anti-Semitic, sexist, and homophobic slurs. They wore Nazi emblems and carried pictures of Hitler. They wore Make America Great Again hats and held pictures of the President of the United States. And they had automatic weapons, paramilitary uniforms, shields, and clubs.

Today was a tragic day, a day that ended in the loss of life and in a city left reeling. We lift in our prayers the family of the person who lost their life, their community, all the people injured and traumatized by the events - especially my siblings of color, people of Jewish faith and ancestry, and those who identify as transgender, queer, lesbian, gay and bisexual - and the city and community of Charlottesville. And too – we lift in our hearts a prayer that for all those whose spirits have been distorted by fear and violence – that they may come to know the capacity for love in their own hearts and spirits. As a people of faith, it is this overflowing, deep abiding love that must guide us to show up again and again for justice, for inclusion, for dignity and humanity.
