#### CUUPS Oaken Circle Samhein festivities! Saturday, November 2, 2019 - 6 pm

Samhain (pronounced Sow-en), is an ancient Celtic tradition and celebration that marks the end of Summer and beginning of Autumn. Although the word technically means Summer's End (derived from Sam meaning Summer and Fuin meaning End), it is (traditionally) celebrated at sunset on the last day of Summer and follows from there to the dawn of the first day of Autumn.

This day is marked by several different traditions that have been adopted from various pagan based communities and can include old and NEW ways to celebrate. Perhaps your family does as the old Celtic families did... a good end of summer cleaning of the home to clear out the old and start the winter months with a fresh, clean household. Perhaps you do as the old ones did and extinguish all fires or electric lights on the 31st of October before sunset and wait in the darkness to ritually ignite a fresh NEW fire or light to symbolize the coming of the dark half of the year. Or maybe your family honors the ancestors on this night, capitalizing on a time when the Veil between the Afterlife and this world is thinnest by having a séance, decorating lavishly and celebrating Dia de Los Muertos, or hosting a dumb supper? Whatever you do to celebrate this turning of the Wheel, chances are very good that what you do is a very OLD tradition.

Join the Oaken Circle CUUPS group at the UU church on November 2nd, 2019 at 6 pm for their annual Samhain festivities and bring the children! Costumes and festive holiday spirit is encouraged! Bring a photo of a beloved departed family member for the Ancestors Altar and choose a flower and candle to decorate with! Come trace your hand and the hands of your family to write the names of those who have gone before us so we can add it to our "UU Family Autumn Tree" for remembrance. There will be a Samhain Ritual, a potluck feast, a recipe raffle, a craft auction, and MUCH more for young and old to enjoy as we once again celebrate the spirit of our beloved community both near and dear... and departed!! We look forward to another fantastic Samhain celebration with you all! Our Samhain ritual leader will be Deborah Mackenzie (Marine-Hill)!
